AB 392/Chan <i>Consolidated Contract</i>	On Senate Floor Inactive File.	Expands the ability of a county to implement an integrated health and human services system.	S-1
AB 576/Wolk <i>IZ Registry</i>	In Senate Health Committee. Also referred to Senate Judiciary Committee. <b>Amended 2/14/06.</b>	Allows patient physicians, local health departments and DHS to maintain access to immunization records when a patient refuses the sharing of this information.	S-2
AB 586/Negrete McLeod <i>EMS/BT</i>	In Senate Health Committee. Last amended 5/26/05.	Allows the health officer and the local EMS agency administrator to jointly appoint a medical/health operational area coordinator charged with coordinating the development of a medical and health disaster system. Requires DHS and EMSA to develop disaster medical and health regulations.	Special Interest Bill
AB 699/Chan <i>Public Health</i>	On Assembly Floor. Passed to Senate (48-32). Referred to Senate Health Committee.	Requires DHS to determine the amounts of influenza vaccine available in the state each year. Compels vaccine distributors and pharmacy suppliers to divulge their local vaccine supplies. Requires any entity entitled to vaccine in the state to report its inventory upon notice from DHS or LHDs.	Special Interest Bill
AB 959/Frommer <i>Medi-Cal</i>	On Assembly Floor. Passed off the Assembly Floor (79-0). In Senate. Referred to Senate Health Committee.	Allows county (and city) public health clinics, as well as freestanding county primary and specialty care clinics which serve Medi-Cal patients on a fee-for-service basis to participate in the Medicaid Outpatient Supplemental Payment Program.	S-1

SB 162/Ortiz <i>Public Health</i>	On Senate Floor. Passed off Senate Floor (22-12). In Assembly. <b>Referred to Assembly Health Committee.</b>	Establishes the State Department of Public Health, to be headed by the State Health Officer to be appointed by the Governor. Transfers various public health programs to the newly established department.	Special Interest Bill
SB 699/Soto <i>AIDS/HIV</i>	Amended 1/12/06. <u>GUT AND AMEND.</u> Amended 1/18/06. Passed off Senate Floor (33-0). In Assembly. <b>Referred to Assembly Health Committee. Set for hearing 2/21/06.</b>	Changes HIV reporting system to names-based system. (Replaced SB 945 which was dropped from the hot sheet.)	S-2

## **Definitions of Legislative Terms**

**Chapered** – A bill passed by the Legislature and signed into law by the Governor.

**Concurrence** – The approval by the house of origin of a bill that was amended in the opposite house .

**Dead Bill** – A bill that has not met legislative deadlines for passage. Usually occurs at the beginning of the second year of a two-year legislative session.

**Failed Passage** – A bill that has been voted on in either a committee or assembly or senate floor and did not receive a majority vote. An urgency measure or tax increase must receive 2/3 vote on the floor.

**Gut and Amend** – An amended bill where the previous legislative language is removed and replaced with entirely new subject matter.

**Held in Committee** – Status of a bill that is heard in committee but no action is taken.

**Inactive File** – A bill ready for floor consideration but placed on a dormant list upon the author's request.

**Interim Study** – The assignment of a bill's subject matter to the appropriate committee for study during the period the Legislature is not in session.

**Reconsideration Granted** – A motion giving the opportunity to take another vote on a bill that has failed passage in a committee hearing or floor session.

**Rules Committee** – All bills are initially referred to this committee in each house for policy committee assignments.

**Spot Bill (or intent bill)** – A bill that proposes nonsubstantive changes to a code section in a particular subject. Often used as a legislative vehicle later in the legislative session for ideas not fully fleshed out when the bill is introduced.

**Suspense File** – Bills meeting a certain appropriation threshold in fiscal committees are placed on the suspense file. Fiscal committees in each house hold a special hearing close to the fiscal committee deadlines (late May and August) to determine which bills will come off the suspense file and move forward. The decision on each bill is pre-determined by leadership and the committee vote is mostly a formality.
